The Technical Assistance Partnership – Expert Deployment Mechanism (TAP-EDM)

Funded by Global Affairs Canada and implemented by <u>Alinea International</u>, TAP-EDM is a short-term technical assistance initiative aimed at strengthening the capacity of national institutions in partner countries to manage policies in a more inclusive and gender-sensitive way. In line with Canada's Feminist International Assistance Policy, it integrates gender equality, climate action, environmental sustainability, human rights and good governance. With an investment of C\$18.75 million, this four-year project will involve more than 120 Canadian experts in 75 to 80 technical assistance initiatives designed to meet the capacity-development needs of beneficiary countries.

Dr. Joe Michael |

Land Acknowledgment

Mi'kmaw Indigenous Elder

Elder Joe Michael, who was awarded an honorary Doctor of Humanities from Acadia in 2019, is a highly regarded inspirational and spiritual leader within the Mi'kmaw Nation, Indigenous communities across Canada, and on Acadia's campus, particularly with students interested in learning traditional knowledge. He was recently appointed to the Mi'kmaq Grand Council. Elder Joe Michael was the first Mi'kmaw member of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. During his 25-year RCMP career, he earned respect from Indigenous and non-Indigenous communities. He combined his traditional knowledge with contemporary policing practices to increase cross-cultural awareness and develop the RCMP's Aboriginal Community Policing model that remains part of the force's cadet training program in Regina.

Gordon Smith | Keynote Speaker

Gordon has over 35 years of consulting and government experience, having completed over 160 planning and design projects for a variety of public and private clients throughout Canada, the United States, and Botswana, Africa. Gordon began incorporating climate change considerations into his practice over 20 years ago and for the past decade, his work has focused on the issue with specialist knowledge in coastal issues and climate change adaptation. Gordons's range of experience from site design to provincial policy development has allowed him to understand how decisions at a macroscale can influence decisions on a site and vice versa. Gordon is particularly interested in multi-disciplinary, collaborative work and how the successful interaction of different professions and stakeholders can add value to projects by creating innovative solutions to wicked problems and opportunities on a variety of levels.

This earned her the prestigious 2025 Canada's Clean50 Award. She has worked as program and project coordinator on biodiversity conservation & education projects, as a co-program lead of the Maritimes Important Bird Areas Program, as Executive Director of Cape Jourimain Nature Centre, for Parks Canada as an ecosystem scientist, and as climate change adaptation consultant with Aster Group Environmental Services Co-op, of which she is a co-founder. She sits on the Board of Directors of Aster Foundation and is currently chair of Nature Canada.

Samantha Page is a climate resiliency expert with over ten years of multi-sector experience managing and implementing climate adaptation projects and policies in Canada, the Caribbean, Africa, Asia, and Central and South America. She specializes in resilient infrastructure, coastal adaptation, risk and vulnerability assessments, policy development, municipal planning, climate finance, and building community and institutional capacity to respond to climate impacts. She spent two years in the Canadian Arctic supporting Indigenous climate action, led the Canada-wide Educating Coastal Communities About Sea-level Rise project, and was instrumental in launching the Coastal Protection Act in 2018. She currently leads the international team at the Climate Risk Institute and is managing technical assistance projects in Somalia, Kenya, and São Tomé & Príncipe.

Simron Singh | Forum Panelist

Professor and University Research Chair, University of Waterloo TAP Expert

Simron J. Singh is a professor at the Faculty of Environment at the University of Waterloo. Using the analogy that islands function like living organisms, he conducts socio-metabolic research to evaluate how small island economies utilize (or metabolize) materials, energy, water, and infrastructure. He investigates why and how these consumption patterns (or island metabolism) may accumulate "socio-metabolic risk" over time that increase their susceptibility to the challenges of climate change. He further analyzes how island economies can transition to a more sustainable, circular resource-use model, thereby bolstering their overall resilience to the impact of climate change. His research partnerships span island nations in the Caribbean, Mediterranean, and Asia-Pacific regions.
